- 1. COLLEGE ESSAY IS DUE to Canvas on or by JULY 1st.
- 2. NOVEL- Say/Mean/Matter Charts AND Cornell Notes ARE DUE to Canvas on or by JULY 30th. (Examples on the the following pages)
- 3. Turn in your highlighted/annotated paperback BOOK by AUGUST 12th.

By July 1, you need to complete the following:

I. The College Essay (25 points) Length = 500-650 Words

Research the application for a college or university (hopefully one you are considering). Select an essay prompt from that application. If you do not know where you want to attend, examine **Common Application Essay Prompts 2022** and choose one of the seven prompts. Type a quality 4+ paragraph essay to that prompt (MLA format, please), making sure to type the entire prompt at the top. By July 30, you need to complete the following:

- II. Assignments for Banned/Challenged Novel- See next page for options (75 points)
- A. Say/Mean/Matter (20 points)- this process requires you to keep track of the more meaningful quotes in the work. Your 4 quotations and commentary should reflect the WHOLE text. An example of the assigned format is at the end of this document (Appendix A). There is an example chart for Say/Mean/Matter at the end of this document that you can copy and paste 4 times into your own word document, or you can create a chart of your own.
- **B.** Cornell Notes (40 points)- this style of note taking requires plot summary and a close reading of the author's writing style (tone, irony, foreshadowing, theme, diction, symbolism, imagery, and motifs). There is an example chart for Cornell Notes at the end of this document (Appendix B) that you can copy and paste 4 times into your own word document, or you can create a chart of your own. You will divide your novel into 4 equal parts and complete a chart on each part for a total of 4 Cornell Note charts.
- C. Hand in your highlighted and annotated novel.

(Due on the 1st day of school for 15 points)

Choices: DO NOT select a work that you have already read.

Purchase a paperback copy of your novel (Suggestion: Purchase from Amazon)

- The Color Purple- Alice Walker
- Dracula- Bram Stoker
- I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings- Maya Angelou
- One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest- Ken Kesey
- Heart of Darkness-Joseph Conrad

This assignment is designed to further expand and refine your skills in reading and analyzing literature. Before deciding upon a book from the list below, you should consider researching the author, the year the work was written or published, the reason(s) it has been challenged, and its length. Choose a storyline intrigues you!

Guidelines:

- Submit your typed college essay of 500-650 words by July 1st.
- Read one banned/challenged work of literary merit from the list.
- Submit that typed Say/Mean/Matter Character and typed Cornell Notes by July 30th
- Bring the copy of your highlighted/annotated novel on the first day of school.
- Both content and composition should come entirely from YOU: YOUR thoughts, YOUR words. PLAGIARISM is a violation of academic excellence and will result in a zero for the entire assignment.
- Demonstrate mature time management, budgeting your time to reflect your true academic ability.

Appendix A

SAY/ MEAN/ MATTER (Copy 4 charts)

Novel- Your 4 quotations should <u>reflect the WHOLE text.</u>

- 1. What does it say? Find a significant sentence / group of sentences in the text. Copy as a quotation (word for word) in the <u>Say</u> column. Indicate the correct page number.
- 2. What does it mean? In the <u>Mean</u> column, paraphrase the quoted passage so that it is clear that you understand what it means. MAKE SURE YOU RELY UPON YOUR OWN WORDS!
- 3. Why does it matter? In the <u>Matter</u> column, comment on why the passage is significant to the reader's understanding. Explain how the excerpt advances the author's message as well as how it connects to your own life. The <u>Matter</u> column should be the longest and most detailed of the three requirements.
